Would you feel comfortable working with this person for eight hours or more? How is this photographer going to walk you through this day?

So relax, have a wonderful wedding surrounded by the love of your friends and family. And let your professional photographer capture the memories you'll treasure for a lifetime.

Wedding Traditions and Symbols

This saying dates back to Victorian time and the full version is 'something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue and a silver sixpence in her shoe.

Something Old represents the link with the bride's family and the past. A common solution many brides choose is to wear a piece of family jewelry or their mother's or grandmother's wedding dress.

Something New represents good fortune and success in the bride's new life. The wedding dress is often chosen as the new item.

Something Borrowed is to remind the bride that friends and family will be there for her when help is needed. The borrowed object might be something such as a lace handkerchief or an item of jewelry.

Something Blue symbolizes of faithfulness and loyalty and dates back to biblical times when blue represented purity. Frequently the brides garter is the blue item.

A Silver Sixpence in her Shoe is to wish the bride wealth both financial and happiness.

Wedding gifts are bought by the guests have replaced the custom of bringing fruits that used to encourage fertility.

The wedding veil hides the brides beauty and wards off evil spirits.

Another explanation is that during the times of arranged marriages the brides face would be covered until the groom had committed to the marriage.

The throwing of the wedding bouquet was introduced from America and it is said that who ever catches the bouquet will be next to be married.

Confetti has replaced rice or grain in modern times, the rice was thrown at the bride and groom to encourage fertility.

The bride stands on the left of the groom during the marriage ceremony to allow his sword arm to be free ready to fight off other men who may want her as their bride.

Carrying the bride over the threshold protects her from any evil spirits that may be lurking in the new home.

The tradition of giving guests something to remember the day by in the form of favors has been around for hundreds of years. Today, the tradition has evolved to giving each guest five sugar coated almonds to symbolize health, wealth, fertility, happiness and long-life.

Your D.J. should have professional audio equipment, suitable for the size of your party, and the ability to tailor the sound to fit the acoustics of the room. The music should be loud enough to dance to, but never so loud that you cannot carry on a conversation.

A disc jockey’s goal is to make sure that all of your guests– from the youngest to the oldest– enjoy the variety of music, taking requests from your guests, and keeping within your specific guidelines of musical taste. They should never embarrass your guests to do things they don’t want to do. An experienced D.J. will read your crowd, and decide what is appropriate.

When selecting the entertainment for your celebration, look for the perfect combination of skill, talent and class.

Remember..... The disc jockey is not the star of your reception, he is there to complement your special day.

Choosing a Videographer for you Wedding

What are the advantages of a videographer? For one, you actually get to watch and enjoy all the festivities you have taken months to plan. You can relive the day any time you like, and without the wedding day jitters.

Choosing the correct videographer for your wedding is just as important as selecting a professional photographer, caterer or florist. Imagine your disc jockey arriving at your reception with a stereo similar to yours at home. There are some things important enough to be left to professionals.

Let your friends relax and enjoy the day with you, and invest in someone you can trust to produce your wedding video.

There is no substitute for experience when it comes to videotaping weddings. You will want someone who knows what to expect, including the unexpected. Find out what your videographer's "day job" is, or their main line of work. Five years experience is one thing if it's every day, and another if it includes only weekends.

An experienced and professional videographer will work well with your professional photographer and officiant. Check with your photographer to learn the names of videographers they have worked with. A professional videographer will work within the guidelines of your church.

Broadcast quality equipment is fundamental when it comes to videotaping weddings. More than one microphone is essential at the ceremony, including a wireless mic on the groom to pick up the vows. Lights should not be used at the ceremony, but are often used at the reception. For the ceremony a good videographer will recommend that two cameras be used. Two camera angles relieve the monotony of one view for the whole time. In addition, there will be times when the second angle will be better than the main one. The cameras at the ceremony should be stationary, so as not to distract from the service.

What really makes a wedding video special and unique are the personal touches added by a professional videographer. Find out what different videographers have to offer, then go with the one best suited to your personalities. A videographer that offers many different options and extras allows you the most opportunity to personalize your video.

After seeking experience, professionalism and quality, be sure to consider personality. How comfortable are you when speaking to the company representative? Remember, this is someone you will be depending on to produce your wedding keepsake. You must be able to work well with them.

Choosing a good videographer is one of the biggest decisions you will make concerning your wedding. Be prepared to shop around, know what to ask for. Don't be afraid to rely on other professionals to help you know where to look. If possible, talk with someone who has had their wedding videotaped to get their reaction and advice.

But the final decision is yours. Remember you can relive your day again and again, with the help of a professional videographer.

The Rite Site

The site you select will depend mainly on the type of atmosphere you want, the number of guests you invite and the budget you have to work with. But there are other factors too.

Hotel or Wedding Facility

Pros

- ◆ Offers a grand entrance with large scale décor
- ◆ Offers space for hundreds of guests
- ◆ Specializes in hosting receptions
- ◆ Has an event manager on staff to assist with planning and preparation
- ◆ Offers various wedding packages and menu options
- ◆ Hotel venues allow out of town guests the convenience of staying at the reception site

Cons

- ◆ Other receptions could be occurring in adjacent spaces
- ◆ Minimum guest requirement may be in effect for use of main ballroom
- ◆ Some clubs are for members only
- ◆ In-house caterer, or property's preferred caterer, may be your only alternative
- ◆ Can be expensive
- ◆ Must be booked well in advance
- ◆ Penalties are likely if your reception runs over its allotted time

Public Park , Garden or Beach

Pros

- ◆ Offers a refreshing atmosphere
- ◆ Can be extremely casual or elegant
- ◆ Nature may be all the décor you need
- ◆ Generally affordable

Cons

- ◆ Weather: an indoor contingency plan is a must
- ◆ Chairs and tables must be rented
- ◆ Power supplies may be insufficient
- ◆ Rest rooms may not be close by
- ◆ Permits may be required for your type of reception
- ◆ Other people may be using an adjacent area causing a disturbance
- ◆ Accessibility for elderly or disabled guests may be problematic
- ◆ Allergy instigators
- ◆ Beautiful outdoor locations book up quickly

Other locations to think about: Private Homes, Community Centers or Congregation halls, Museums or historic buildings and Restaurants or Inns. All sites have pros and cons, look them over carefully, and find the place that's rite for you.



UNFORGETTABLE FLOWERS

When searching for a florist , referrals from friends, family and other wedding professionals are the best way to start. Here are a few tips to help you find the florist for you.

- ◆ When you first meet with a florist, ask to see a portfolio or examples of their work.
- ◆ Come prepared with pictures of the bride's and bridesmaid's dresses, swatches of your wedding theme colors and notes describing the ceremony site and reception hall. Find out if the ceremony site has any restrictions regarding the delivery and placement of the decorations.
- ◆ If you're not comfortable working with the florist from the start, move on. It's unlikely the relationship will improve over time. It's very important that you trust and discuss ideas easily with him.
- ◆ Keep an open mind; an experienced florist is an artist . You're investing in his talent for creating a unique look that's right for your wedding theme and budget.
- ◆ Some decorations can be rented. Your florist may have a variety of options for you to consider, from wreaths to arches.
- ◆ Popular florist can get booked up quickly, so try to secure a florist early in your planning process. Hold off on making the final decisions regarding specific flowers and designs. Ask your florist when he needs to finalize your order.
- ◆ Always get a contract that specifies delivery times and descriptions of agreed bouquets and decorations and the flowers to be used.

We all face stress

Stress is a common factor that all couples planning a wedding share. It may be stress over the little details, money or planning or you may just feel overwhelmed. While you can't eliminate all of the stress inherent in wedding planning, there are a few ways to minimize that stress. In this article you will find common causes of wedding stress and strategies that will help you combat them.

Why is planning stressful? Trying to mesh your ideas of a perfect wedding while also trying to "follow the rules" and trying to keep up with family members' and friends' ideals is certainly a stressful task. One of the best ways to combat this particular stress, is to realize that no wedding will satisfy every guest, and neither will it follow every rule. While it is a gracious thing to ask guests how they might feel about something you are unsure about, it doesn't mean that you must follow every suggestion. You don't need to follow the bridal magazines or etiquette books to the letter either. These items are intended as guides rather than gospel.

All couples want their wedding to match their view of a perfect event. Unfortunately, while in the midst of matching the shoes to the tablecloths to the bouquets, you'll start to feel a bit overwhelmed. Feeling overwhelmed is normal and so is trying your best to make the wedding day "perfect". However, you need to be willing to let a few things go. Figure out which items are less important to you and allow yourself to either delegate those items or ignore them if they aren't necessary.

Another suggestion along the same vein is to remember that, as a couple, there will be two views to consider. Be willing to compromise so that both of you will be able to realize the elements of a "perfect" wedding that are most important to you.

While this is often unavoidable, there are ways to minimize the impact of a shift of control. Angry confrontation is not the answer and will only cause further problems. Communication is the key.

Honest is the best policy. Be honest with yourself and with your guests. You don't need to play the role of mediator. The problems that your guests have with one another is not your problem, it is their problem. Throughout all of it, remember that you are not to blame in any way, for rifts between your guests.

Remember that no wedding is perfect. Remember that you can't please everybody. Be willing to compromise. Delegate responsibility where possible. Communicate effectively (without anger). People are unpredictable.

Take time out to nurture yourself and your relationship.

Every year, as we enter wedding season, I go to pick up a bridal magazine. Then I crumple to the floor with lower-back spasms, because during wedding season, bridal magazines achieve the same mass as Ted Kennedy (D-Mass). They have hundreds of pages of advertisements and articles designed to help the bride, as she gets ready for her Special Day, go completely insane.

She can't help it. Your modern American wedding is more complex, in terms of logistics, than the invasion of Iraq. For one thing, the invasion planners don't have to decide on quest favors: the bride does, and it's not a simple decision. Here is what Modern Bride has to say on the topic in it's 312-pound March issue.

Gone are the days of giving quests mixed nuts in little plastic cups as wedding favors... Brides today have so many options... Choose unique favor containers. tiny tins, clear plastic cones, little gossamer bags.. And fill them with your favorite treats. Give each quest a silver frame.. Or tie a stack of your favorite cookies together with personalized ribbon. The choices are truly endless.

And they are! Truly! Endless! Which is why tonight, while you're snoring the snore of the carefree, some stressed-out-bride-to-be who had once hoped (The Fool) to get by with mixed nuts in a cup, will be staring at her bedroom ceiling, asking herself: Tiny Tins? Gossamer bags? Personalized ribbon? Should I maybe personalize the gossamer? What the hell IS gossamer?

At dawn she's still struggling to make this decision, so she can get on with the other 158,000 critical decisions..decisions she must make by herself, because she stopped talking to her mother weeks ago, following a bitter argument about the cake frosting. The bride alone, must decide on her dress, shoes, flowers, invitations, place cards,caterers, photographer and all the other wedding elements that must be perfect on her special day will be RUINED RUINED RUINED!

And don't tell me that the groom can help. Please . The groom is useless. Statistically speaking, something like 92 percent of all grooms are male. If you let males plan weddings you are going to wind up with skee ball at the reception.

No, the groom dropped out of the picture inures after he proposed. For all the bride knows, he has been kidnapped by aliens.

It does not matter. The bride must plunge grimly ahead, making decision after decision, day after stressful day, night after sleepless night, until she has, at most, two remaining marbles.

Except of course the people who put out the bridal magazines. They'd have to find something useful to do. But I'm sure they'll have no trouble. The choices are truly endless.

The Wedding Planning Countdown by the editors at Modern Bride magazine Here it is—from start to finish, the whole wedding-planning shebang.

12 Months Before

- Announce your engagement
- Arrange for your two sets of parents to get together if they haven't already met.
- Decide on a date.
- Shop for your Gown
- Go over the budget (include both sets of parents if they'll be paying for any portion of the event).
- Interview wedding planners if you'll be using one.
- Pick the ceremony site and visit the officiant.
- Work on guest lists to get a rough head count.
- Visit reception sites and reserve one.

6 – 9 Months Before

- Choose your wedding party.
- Choose a caterer.
- Enroll in a bridal-gift registry.
- Order all Gowns
- Shop for the bridal attendants' dresses.
- Choose a photographer and/or a videographer.
- Hire a florist.
- Book the musicians and/or DJ.

4 – 6 Months Before

- Order the wedding invitations, envelopes, thank-you cards, and any other wedding stationery you need.
- Order the wedding gown.
- Shop for the cake.
- Scout accommodations for out-of-towners so you can send guests a list of nearby hotels in various price ranges. (Most hotels offer lower rates if you tell them a group is coming.)
- Complete the guest list. (Assume 20 percent of the invitees probably can't come.)

2 – 4 Months Before

- Call the county clerk's office to find out about requirements for the marriage license.
- Order the tuxedos for groom and groomsmen.
- Get a blood test, if needed for a license in your state.
- Make your honeymoon reservations. Compile all the necessary travel documents (passport, visas, etc.).
- Meet with the caterer or banquet manager to discuss menus, service style, wine lists, etc.

Shop for wedding bands

Complete honeymoon plans

Meet with party-rental companies, if necessary, for tables, chairs or other items.

4 – 8 Weeks Before

Mail invitations eight weeks ahead of the date.

Do a hair and makeup run-through (with headpiece)

Book your favorite beauty pros to prepare you for that all-eyes-on-you moment.

Look over insurance papers with your fiancée (car, life, medical, home)—you may need to make changes in the policy when you go from single to married.

2 – 3 Weeks Before

Puzzle time: Do seating for the reception

Confirm details with the photographer, florist, etc.

Give caterer final head count.

Send an engagement photograph with a wedding announcement to newspapers.

Have your final dress fitting

1 Week Before

Host bridesmaids' party

Place fees in envelopes to be given to the organist, soloist, minister, etc. on the big day.

Appoint a punctual pal to bring the cake knife, toasting glasses or other heirlooms to the wedding site early (and be responsible for getting them home again).

get a manicure, pedicure, facial, massage or other beauty treatments of your choice.

Pack for the honeymoon (arrange for someone to bring your luggage and going-away outfits to the reception site if you're leaving from the reception).

The Day Before

Greet out-of-town guests

Go to the gym, take a long walk, or do some other stress-reducing activity

Schedule time for beauty—a manicure touch-up or a hairstyling appointment—before the rehearsal dinner.

Hit the wedding rehearsal and dinner following.


